What is hospice?

- Hospice is a program that provides care for a person who is terminally ill with weeks to months to live.
- Hospice assists the patient to remain in their home setting surrounded by family and loved ones till death.
- Hospice accepts death as a natural part of life. We offer compassionate care aimed at helping people live as comfortably as possible while preserving their dignity.
- Hospice uses a comprehensive team of trained professionals and volunteers to care for the physical, emotional, social, and spiritual needs of those nearing end-of-life.
- Hospice will talk openly about the dying process with patients, families and caregivers, but also respects the wishes of those who do not want to talk about dying.
- Hospice provides bereavement support after death to the family and caregivers.

Who are volunteers?

We ask that you wait one year after experiencing the loss of a loved one before taking the training.



What do volunteers do?

Support for Patients

Volunteers lend support to hospice patients by visiting, reading, taking walks, scenic car rides, writing letters, enjoying music or just quietly sitting and being there.

Respite for Family Members

Volunteers can assist with shopping or household maintenance, or allow family caregivers the opportunity to run necessary errands and take time away from home. Family members also appreciate a visit from a compassionate friend who may understand what they are going through.

Bereavement Support

Hospice volunteers may have an interest in working closely with the hospice bereavement professionals. Duties range from assisting as a support group facilitator to helping with mailings.

Administrative Work

Volunteers with clerical skills can serve others by helping in the office with administrative tasks.



Audio Storytelling

Volunteers can assist patients who would like to tell their life story through audio recordings or written transcripts that can be given to the family as a gift of remembrance.

Teddy Bear Care

A special project provided by volunteers is to make teddy bears out of a favorite clothing item of patients. Aspirus At Home provides the pattern and the family provides the article of clothing. The bears are then given to the family as a gift and remembrance of their lives. Volunteers place their names on the "Teddy Bear Care" list and are called upon when bears are needed.
