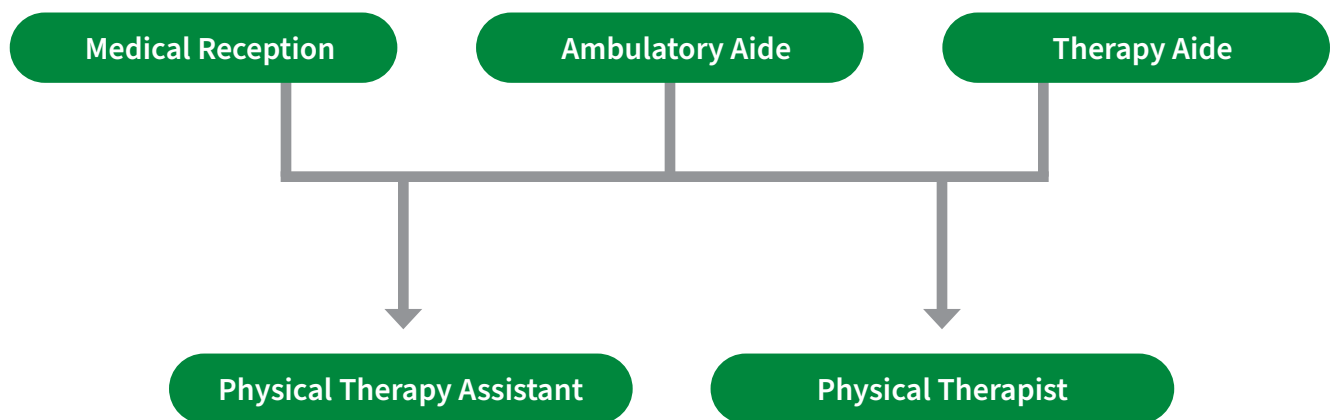

Leadership and Operations

Therapy professionals can advance into leadership and administrative roles, progressing through supervisory, managerial, director, and executive positions while expanding their expertise and influence.

Medical Reception

A Medical Receptionist gains experience through direct patient interactions and exposure to healthcare systems and workflows by greeting patients, managing check-ins and appointments, updating records, and handling phone communications.

Education/Training: Knowledge of office procedures normally acquired through completion of a high school diploma, GED or equivalent combination.

Requirements/Experience: Preferred customer service or healthcare experience, computer and keyboarding experience.

Therapy Aide

A Therapy Aide is a non-licensed staff member who has completed on the job training and works under the supervision of a licensed therapist to provide patient care.

Education/Training: High school diploma or GED. CPR/BLS training provided upon hire.

Requirements/Experience: Previous experience beneficial.

Ambulatory Aide

The Ambulation Technician is a non-licensed worker who has completed on the job training to assist patients to safely ambulating and are recovering from injuries, illnesses or surgery during their inpatient admission.

Education/Training: High school diploma or GED. CPR/BLS training provided upon hire.

Requirements/Experience: Previous experience as nursing assistant or aide beneficial.

Physical Therapist Assistant

Physical Therapy Assistants are licensed clinicians who provide care under the direction and supervision of a physical therapist. As a team, PTs and PTAs work to help improve movement function. Physical Therapy Assistants treat patients in a wide variety of settings including, but not limited to, hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and outpatient locations.

Education/Training: Associate's degree in physical therapy assistant program. CPR/BLS training provided upon hire.

Requirements/Experience: State PTA licensure.

Physical Therapist

A Physical Therapist is a licensed healthcare professional who diagnosis and treats individuals to improve movement and manage pain caused by injury, disease, or other conditions. Physical therapists evaluate and treat patients in a wide variety of settings including but not limited to hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and outpatient locations.

Education/Training: Bachelor's degree in physical therapy. CPR/BLS training provided upon hire.

Requirements/Experience: State PT licensure.
